Speaker: Brad Ohlinger, PhD Graduated student at Virginia Tech

Presentation: Waggle Dances Communicate Honey Bee Forage Availability in Representative Landscapes in Virginia

Brad Ohlinger is studying honeybee behavior using waggle dances and pollen analysis to monitor honeybee foraging in representative landscapes in Virginia. He aims to use his research to gain a better understanding of the obstacles that bees face in different landscapes and provide recommendations for the effective management of pollinator habitat. Before coming to Virginia Tech, Brad earned a Bachelor of Science in Environmental Science from Albright College in Reading, PA and a Master of Science in Biology from Bloomsburg University in Bloomsburg, PA.

The objectives of his research include:

- *Describe- Determine honey bee foraging dynamics in the three landscapes (Phase 1)
- *Analyze- Compare trends in honey bee foraging across the three landscapes to identify predictors of honey bee foraging (Phase 2)
- *Prescribe- Use our understanding of honey bee foraging to inform the management of pollinator habitat.

<u>Developing honey bees as bio indicators</u>

Phase 1: Investigate honeybee foraging dynamics within three representative landscapes in Virginia.

Phase 2: Compare honey bee foraging between the three locations to determine important predictors of foraging behavior across the representative areas.

Phase 3: Compare honey foraging with non-apis pollinator diversity and abundance.

The three sites included in this research:

Site 1 Winchester, Virginia - Apples Orchards

Site 2 Tidewater Agricultural Research and Extension Center -412 acres of agricultural research land devoted to row crop production – cotton, peanuts, soybean, small grains and corn

Site 3 Prices Fork Research Station in Blacksburg, Virginia- mixed mosaic pasture, cropland, adjacent to suburban and forested areas.

- *Honeybees contribute \$15 Billion annually to the USA economy each year.
- *Honeybees hives have declined since the 1940's from 5 million to 2.5 million today. 🗇
- *The 5 P's have contributed to this decline.
